BACKGROUND

- In 2013, Metro Atlanta conducted 6th homeless count and survey -2003, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2011, 2013
- City of Atlanta, DeKalb County and Fulton County
- Required by HUD to receive federal funding
 -biannually and last 10 days in Jan.
- Homeless count conducted on 1/28/13
- Community homeless survey conducted Feb. to April, 2013
- Survey typically asks about demographics, homeless history, and disabling conditions
 - -New sections included: health concerns, social services, and family reunification

METHODOLOGY

• Representative sample based on gender, family status, and sleeping location (emergency shelter / transitional housing vs. unsheltered)

Comparison of 2013 Metro Atlanta Homeless Census to Survey

	2013 Homeless Survey	2013 Homeless Census
Individual Adult Males	63%	68%
Family Members	23%	17%
Sheltered Locations	65%	69%

- Total of 577 completed surveys
- Surveyed adults only both unaccompanied and head of households

METHODOLOGY

- Data collected at 10 locations, i.e. meal sites, service providers and housing programs
- Peer to peer interview using homeless Veterans
 -Written as self-administered survey
- Took about 15 minutes to complete
- Provide \$5 fast food gift card for incentive




CHARACTERISTICS






HOMELESS HISTORY






Duration of Homelessness





Closing the Gap

• Issues:

- 1. Individuals become homeless for many different reasons.
- 2. The health care needs of individuals experiencing homelessness likely differ depending on the reasons why they became homeless.
- 3. Appropriate coordination of care is dependent upon service agencies' ability to identify and understand individuals' unique histories and future needs.

Methodology

• Data Collected in April, 2013

Examined Descriptive Statistics

Identified Traditional Group Differences

Considered the use of Latent Class Analysis

Latent Class Analysis (LCA)

- The real world is a very heterogeneous place.
- Similar to Cluster Analysis
- LCA is used to identify naturally occurring groups based on a set of variables.
- LCA can be used to identify clusters of individuals that share similar patterns of responses to a set of questions.
- The researcher can test and compare the results using a different number of groups to find the best solution.

Potential Utility of LCA

LCA can be used to help answer:

- Do individuals with a common set of demographic characteristics (e.g. age, gender, ethnicity, income, immigration status) differ in their health care needs?
- Are there identifiable patterns of behavior that are associated with different health outcomes?

Current Investigation

1. Can individuals experiencing homelessness be organized into unique groups using latent class analysis based on their self-identified reasons for becoming homeless?

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- 2. Is group membership (also known as class) associated with differences in the time or frequency in which individuals have experienced homelessness?

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- 3. Do the composition of the classes differ based on their demographics or history of homelessness?

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- 6. Do the classes differ in the number and type of services needed?

What We Did

• Individuals were asked:

"What are the primary reasons that caused you to become homeless"


- Individuals were permitted to respond affirmatively to one or more items
- These items were then used to predict class membership in the LCA





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
Results of the Latent Class Analysis


- Analyses comparing 3, 4, 5, and 6 group models were compared.
- The five group model represented the best fit to the data.
- Results of the five group model suggested that respondent pool could be divided into the following classes:
 - Class 1: Disability/Health Issues (4%)
 - Class 2: Alcohol/Mental Health (30%)
 - Class 3: Major Life Changes (3%)
 - Class 4: Financial (7%)
 - Class 5: Job Related (55%)














Class Characteristics

- Class 1: Disability/Health Issues (4%)
 - Individuals with or eligible for SSI/SSDI, with a history of physical and mental illness
- Class 2:Alcohol/Mental Health (30%)
 - Individuals with a history of alcohol/drug use and concurrent mental health illness
- Class 3: Major Life Changes (3%)
 - Individuals who of recently experience residential instability related to release for rehab, jail, death in the family and/or eviction
- Class 4: Financial (7%)
 - Individuals in acute financial crisis associated with loss of job, inability to pay rent, and general loss of money
- Class 5: Job Related (55%)
 - Lost job or otherwise unspecified

Implementation

- Expanded Point-In-Time Count Survey
- Assess the data (e.g. Latent Class Analysis)
 - Identify groups by causes of homelessness
- Match the groups to service use and service needs
 - i.e., identify service gaps and needs
- Create checklist scoring for each group
- Integrate into outreach and initial service contacts

Summary

- Individuals report becoming homeless for distinctly different reasons.
- Classification of individuals based on these reasons identified differences in:
 - Current physical and mental health
 - Different patterns of services use
 - Different patterns of service needs

Conclusion

Components for Success:

- 1) Develop coordinated assessments
 - Determine class using checklist tool and scoring
- 2) Intervention tailored for each subpopulation group
 - Provide comprehensive services for each specific class
