



## What do you hear people say are the main causes of homelessness?

- Underlying all of these individual issues are
  - Poverty
  - Lack of affordable housing

- The official poverty threshold:
  - \$11,770 for individuals
  - \$15,930 for a family of 2
  - \$20,090 for a family of 3
  - \$24,250 for a family of 4
- Or... the condition where people's basic needs are not met.

#### Fair Market Rent

The estimated cost of renting a property with a certain number of bedrooms, in a certain geographic area.

#### Affordable Housing


Housing deemed affordable to those with a median household income as rated by country, state, region or municipality.

#### Housing Wage

The wage you would need to earn in order to pay no more than 30% of your income on the rent- the accepted standard of affordability.


## 2014 HOURS AT MINIMUM WAGE NEEDED TO AFFORD RENT

In no state can a minimum wage worker afford a two-bedroom rental unit at Fair Market Rent, working a standard 40-hour work week, without paying more than 30% of their income.



#### Dominant Narrative

The definitive story that shapes understanding of social reality as told by people in power

- ·Leads to many unstated assumptions about behaviors, values, and life course which imposes prevailing "accepted" rules of every day living
- ·*Hides and justifies power* relationships—privilege and oppression.
- Focuses on individual circumstances at the *exclusion of* structural issues in community and society
- ·Accepts as "given" things that are *neither natural nor inevitable*



# Why is the dominant narrative dangerous?

- Justifies privilege and oppression
- Popularizes stereotypes and stigmatizes individuals
- Keeps people in the dark, prevents real change
- How we define problems defines solutions.
- It is the system that need fixing! Individual solutions are, at best, only a Band-Aid.

"The consequence of the single story is this: It robs people of dignity. It makes our recognition of our equal humanity difficult. It emphasizes how we are different rather than how we are similar."

#### Critical Consciousness

The process of developing a greater awareness and understanding of social, economic, and political contradictions and oppression – and recognition of the power to change them.

#### Internalized Oppression:

The process by which a member of an oppressed group comes to accept and live out the inaccurate myths and stereotypes applied to that group. This can cause feelings of alienation from society and one's true self, and lead to isolation and depression. This process often occurs subconsciously.

## Storytelling is important!

- We deconstruct the dominant narrative by learning to recognize it and realize its influence on our own personal narrative.
- Through sharing our experiences, we begin to see beyond our individual issues and realize that we are not alone!
- As we share our story, we also raise the critical and social consciousness of those with whom we interact—a very necessary ingredient in the fight for social justice and ending homelessness.

# We must always be aware that how we talk about homelessness can...

- Reinforce or challenge stereotypes
- Support the dominant narrative or point to systemic causes
- Victimize and stigmatize those who've experienced homelessness or support their liberation from internalized oppression (selfblame and shame).
